
Our staff members have also been actively enhancing their skills through targeted professional development sessions, ensuring that our commitment to excellence in education continues to strengthen.

#### **GSSD PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

Professional development (PD) plays a crucial role in GSSD's commitment to high quality teaching and learning. Aligned with the long-term goals of improving student outcomes, implementing the "Inspiring Success" Policy, developing GSSD leaders, ensuring consistent practices across GSSD schools and delivering high-quality teaching and learning resources, PD remains a cornerstone of these efforts. Throughout March and April, 2024, GSSD conducted multiple professional development sessions for staff.

PD Event	Date	Topic/Outcome
In-Person Administrator Meeting	March 1, 2024	All GSSD In-School Administrators gathered at the Good Spirit Education Complex for a day of professional development, information sharing, and updates. The professional development session focused on assessment. The rest of the day highlighted Division updates, the use of Edsby Gradebook, and new graduation requirements.
Response to Intervention (RtI) Template Pop- Up Sessions	March 13-14, 2024	School teams, including Professional Service Providers (PSPs), Student Support Teachers (SSTs), Admin and members of the RtI teams learned more about the RtI template. The session focused on the RtI template, designating the meeting type, using the attendance tab to follow AP 340, and files and links.
Nonviolent Crisis Intervention® (NVCI) Training	March 21, 2024	In this one-day session, participants reviewed strategies for safely defusing anxious, dysregulated, hostile, or violent behaviour at the earliest possible stage. Participants included SSTs, administrators, and school counsellors.
Complex Needs	March 27, 2024	Participants from three schools were invited to spend the morning learning more about Autism, Down Syndrome, and the Crisis Cycle from three presenters. In the afternoon school teams presented a complex needs case scenario and were able to access support from the presenters and the GSSD PSP team to build a plan of support.
Social Emotional Learning Integrated Practices	April 8-10, 2024	This PD is part of a three-day event, with the third day scheduled for June 10. Participants from three pilot schools learned about trauma-integrated practices/strategies that align with the Circle of Courage framework to strengthen their knowledge and skills in the social-emotional domains of self-awareness, social awareness, and self-management.

PD Event	Date	Topic/Outcome
Mental Health First Aid Training	April 16-17, 2024	This training was geared towards adults who interact with youth, including coaches, community groups, and community leaders.
Building Thinking Classrooms	April 23-24, 2024	The goal of Thinking Classrooms was to create a culture of deep thinking rather than mere information absorption. Practical teaching practices were identified that can transform any classroom into a thinking classroom; these practices encourage active thinking and bypass normative behaviours.
Annual Student Support Teacher (SST) Professional Learning Corner	April 29, 2024	Topics included reviewing Ministry Inclusion and Intervention Plan requirements, RtI template, MMR, SST roles and responsibilities, Educational Assistant feedback, and break-out sessions planned for the afternoon.





## **BUILDING THINKING CLASSROOMS, APRIL 23 & 24, 2024**

Recently, GSEC hosted two days of professional development opportunities centered around "Building Thinking Classrooms." This innovative concept, championed by Peter Liljedahl, a researcher from Simon Fraser University in Canada, aims to transform traditional classrooms into dynamic spaces where students actively participate in problem-solving, critical thinking, and collaborative exploration.



Liljedahl's work spans over a decade, emphasizing the shift from passive information absorption to deep thinking. To achieve this, he identifies practical teaching practices that can turn any classroom into a thinking classroom. These strategies encourage active student engagement and challenge normative behaviors.





During the sessions which were facilitated by Kyle Webb, podcast host of "Think Thank Thunk," participants explored topics such as hints and extensions, trauma-informed practices, and practical strategies for creating environments conducive to problem-based learning.



Notably, educators from Good Spirit School Division, Keeseekoose Chiefs' Education Centre, and Prairie Valley School Division actively participated in these enriching sessions.

It's inspiring to see educators and professionals coming together to enhance teaching practices and create more effective learning environments!

The performances, ranging from dance solos to spoken introductions and group work, resonated with themes of resilience, authenticity, and musicality. #### CANORA JUNIOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL CREATES PYSANKY ПИСАТИ

On Tuesday, March 26, 2024, Grade 4 students at Canora Junior Elementary School (CJES) spent an entire day demonstrating their learning and putting into action their own creations of Pysanky писати. The Grade 4 students spent time in the classroom days prior to the event learning about the different tools to use, the steps of the писати process, the meaning and history behind the intricate designs, and the complete and utter concentration and persistence necessary in learning this skilled art. Students first planned out their creations on paper and used this as their guide with the eggs, beeswax, and coloured dyes.

Pysanky are raw eggs that are decorated using an ancient wax-resistance method. The word pysanky comes from the Ukrainian word pysaty (писати) which means "to write." Pysanky is an ancient art that originated in Ukraine and other Slavic countries. The practice of this artform has occurred for centuries and has been a popular one here with Canora's strong Ukrainian heritage.

The designs are "written" in hot wax with a special tool called a kistka (кістка) which has a small funnel attached to hold a small amount of liquid wax. The wax protects the pores of the egg shell from the dye. A small amount of beeswax is put into the top of the funnel and then melted in the flame of a candle before it is applied to the egg covering up the colour the artist is wanting to preserve for their creation. The artist, known as a pysankarka (писанкарка) writes parts of the design, dyes the egg one color, and writes more, following this process until the end, when all the layers of wax are melted off to reveal the final colorful and intricate design.

CJES is grateful to Grade 4 teachers Mrs. Exner and Mrs. Ostafie for their planning of this event for the students. CJES is also grateful to the many parents and grandparents who came to support their Grade 4 child on this family engagement day. As you can see from the photos, CJES has many talented and proud Pysanky writers!



















## CROSS-SCHOOL BOOK CLUB HELD AT LANGENBURG CENTRAL, MELVILLE COMPREHENSIVE, AND ESTERHAZY HIGH SCHOOLS

How do we learn to embrace all parts of our identity?

How can we find common ground with those we perceive as different from ourselves?

How do our relationships influence how we learn to see ourselves?

How are the challenges we face influenced by our mindset?

These are the questions that some Grade 7 and 8 students explored through their cross-school book clubs this year. Students from Langenburg Central School (LCS), Melville Comprehensive School (MCS), and Esterhazy High School (EHS) were given five novels to choose from. Once each student selected the novel they wanted to read, they were put into groups with students from other schools who also chose that novel. Throughout February and March, despite technology challenges, students engaged in online discussions and live virtual meetings with their book clubs through Google classroom.

The culminating project was for each student to create a visual essay to represent their understanding of one of the themes from their novel. Students from all the participating schools came together at LCS for a showcase of their final projects. During the showcase, students had the opportunity to share their project as well as explore the visual essays other students created. To wrap-up the entire unit, students were able to sit with their books clubs over lunch and discuss final thoughts on their books and the project overall.

There were definitely some nerves as students were arriving at LCS, but once the day got going, students really enjoyed the experience and many realized talking to new people wasn't as nerve wracking as they thought.

Congratulations go out to Team Wolverines for accumulating a whopping 304 total house points for the afternoon!


















## **GRAYSON SCHOOL ENHANCES LEARNING THROUGH INTERGENERATIONAL CONNECTIONS**

On Wednesday, April 10, Good Spirit School Division in partnership with RDIEC (Regina District Industry Education Council), Suncrest College and Pattison Agriculture hosted the first ever 'THINK Ag Event' at Pattison Ag and Suncrest College. A 'THINK' event is an opportunity for students to meet and learn about potential career opportunities within a particular job cluster.



All in all, the organizers deemed the day to be a huge success! Originally 63 grade 10-12 students from across the Good Spirit School Division had registered. The date of April 10 was chosen after the first date in March was pre-empted by province-wide strike action. The event proceeded with a shortened agenda to allow for the co-curricular day to proceed within the STF 'Work to Rule' Guidelines that were in place at the time. Fifty-four (54) students attended the day's events representing; Canora, Churchbridge, Esterhazy, Langenburg, Melville, Norquay, Preeceville, Sturgis, and Yorkton Regional High School.



The day was very full and moved along rather quickly. Students arrived at Pattison Ag and were seated in the Pattison Teaching Theatre and took part in a presentation from the Ministry of Agriculture that involved an interactive game in which four students won additional prizes on top of the swag items that all students received. Second on the agenda was a site tour of the Pattison Ag Facility followed by a presentation showcasing potential career opportunities within the Pattison Organization. The students then took part in a

panel discussion that featured representatives from Agronomy, Trades, AgBusiness, and Animal Science.

After the panel discussion the students were moved to the Suncrest Trades and Technology Centre (STTC). At STTC various organizations had booths set up for the students to learn more about their organization and to potentially drop off resumes for summer and future employment opportunities. Booths were on site from: Sask Crop Insurance, Pattison Ag, Louis Dreyfus Company, Cargill, Mosaic, Grain Millers, U of S College of Agriculture, Claas, and Legacy Co-Op.

After a wonderful pizza lunch that was catered by the YRHS Cafeteria, the students finished the day with five presentations from the University of Saskatchewan College of Agriculture, Mosaic, Sask Crop Insurance, Louis Dreyfus Company, and Grain Millers.

## **THINK TRADES, APRIL 18, 2024**

On Thursday, April 18, 70 grade 10-12 students from eight different high schools within the Good Spirit School Division (GSSD) were welcomed to the Yorkton Regional High School (YRHS) Teaching Theatre for the start of THINK Trades, a Career Exploration Event. At a 'THINK' event students are introduced to possible careers within a specific job sector.

THINK Trades was sponsored by RDIEC (Regina District Industry Education Council) of which the GSSD is an affiliate member representing the East Central area of the province. Other sponsors included Suncrest College, Credence Construction and Louis Dreyfus Company. The day started at the YRHS where the attendees heard all about the benefits of pursuing apprenticeship from Garth Hunter of the SATCC (Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trades Certification Commission). The group of students was then divided into two tour groups. One group took in a 'scaffolding demonstration' presented by Credence Construction and the other group were taken on an HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning)/Electrical Tour of the YRHS by GSSD Facilities Coordinator Chad Rennie. Mr. Rennie showed the group the highlights of the recent 19.5 million dollar upgrade to the school division's largest high school. After each group took part in both tours it was time for lunch.

After a fantastic pizza lunch served up by the YRHS cafeteria, the attendees were treated to a presentation from Louis Dreyfus Company, (LDC). LDC shared their current expansion plans and mentioned how they are in the process of adding another 120 positions to their operation. Selest Morley, LDC Human Resources Manager along with two of her colleagues discussed the many trades-related opportunities available. After the presentation from LDC the two groups were once again on the road to explore other trades opportunities within the city.

While one group headed to Rocky Mountain Equipment for a tradescareers presentation and tour of their new facility, the other group headed to Suncrest College. At Suncrest College the students were introduced to the HETTT (Heavy Equipment Truck and Trailor Transport) Program, as well as the Power Engineering course that the school offers. Once the two groups switched up their tour sites the day came to an end with all who attended having learned a significant amount about life as a tradesperson.

The next THINK Event is the THINK Health Event on Wednesday, May 8. This event is being held at Suncrest College and will showcase careers in four of the main healthcare sectors; Nursing, Therapies, Medical Lab Sciences, and Emergency Medical Services (EMS).




## CANORA COMPOSITE SCHOOL HOSTS THE WHITE HATTER, BRINGING CYBERBULLYING TO THE FOREFRONT

On March 27th, Canora Composite School (CCS) hosted The White Hatter, a company that offers comprehensive training designed to equip individuals with essential skills and knowledge for navigating today's digital landscape. These presentations highlight the ongoing commitment to educate students on the importance of respectful and legal digital interactions. The presentations were made possible by Canora Composite School's initiative, with support from the Good Spirit School Division, which provided funding through the Comprehensive School Community Health budget.

In the presentation for grades 5-7, The White Hatter addressed cyberbullying as a type of digital peer aggression involving text messages, social media, and online gaming. The discussion highlighted how these acts, driven by power imbalances and social status, affect 32% of teens and stressed the significance of recognizing the real-world impacts of one's digital actions.

The conversation with senior students was directed towards more mature topics like sexting and the legal consequences tied to sharing intimate images without consent. As the digital landscape continues to evolve, it is crucial for students and parents to understand how to navigate it safely and responsibly.



Bus driving becomes a part of your life ... a noble 'obligation' to try to make it through all kinds of crazy weather and conditions. May 2, 1997, the city was paralyzed by almost two feet of heart attack type snow ... one of the only vehicles that was still moving, was the school bus.

I like having other drivers on the 'ride along' because it provides a chance to share any concerns or procedures that work well with them and ideas to deal with adversities and generally see how other drivers are doing on their runs.

If you are someone who enjoys all kinds of students and the challenges that Saskatchewan can throw at you year-round, the hours work well, the pension reward at the end is nice and the holiday period through the summer months is hard to beat.
