

MINECRAFT FOR TEACHERS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - OCTOBER 15, 2024



Logics Academy provided an engaging professional development opportunity for Good Spirit School Division teachers from Grades 4-9, introducing them to the educational potential of Minecraft.

Held as a one-day, in-person event in the Birch Room at the Good Spirit Education Complex, the session equipped teachers with hands-on experience in using Minecraft as a powerful tool. Through this immersive workshop, educators explored how to harness Minecraft's interactive world to enhance student engagement and other educational outcomes.





KAMSACK COMPREHENSIVE INSTITUTE BAND STUDENTS PARTAKE IN MOUNT RUSHMORE BAND TRIP





The 2024 Kamsack Comprehensive Institute band trip took students on an enriching journey to Mount Rushmore and other cultural and natural highlights in the area. The group began with a stop at the University of Mary in Bismarck, North Dakota, where they participated in instrumental clinics with fourth-year students and professors. The KCI band joined a 62-student class, sharing a workshop experience led by Dennis Gowan, chair of the music department. Students enjoyed a taste of local dining and a classic movie experience at Bismarck's Grand 22 Theater.

The group continued to the Black Hills, basing their stay in cozy Rockerville cabins just outside Mount Rushmore. In addition to excursions, they enjoyed BBQ dinners, campfires, and group games, creating a close-knit atmosphere. Highlights of their travels included the Rushmore Cave Tour and exploring Downtown Custer, where students saw the iconic, artist-painted buffalo statues and visited local shops.













A memorable part of the trip was a visit to the Crazy Horse Memorial, where students learned about the dedication to preserving Native American culture through the Indian Museum of North America and the Native American Educational and Cultural Center. Another highlight was the drive through Custer State Park's Wildlife Loop, where students spotted diverse wildlife like bighorn sheep and wild turkeys.

In addition to witnessing the awe-inspiring Mount Rushmore and its evening lighting ceremony, the group experienced a roundup of 1,400 bison at Custer State Park, a longstanding tradition. Other adventures included Bear Country USA, a drive-through park with numerous North American mammals, and a tour of Reptile Gardens, a botanical park with rare reptiles and beautiful plant life.

One of the trip's physical challenges was the hike up Bear Butte at Bear Butte State Park, a site sacred to many Indigenous tribes. Students were rewarded with panoramic views across multiple states, perfectly timed with a stunning sunset. Ending their trip, students explored Devils Tower, a unique geological formation that is sacred to Indigenous peoples.

The KCI band trip will surely be remembered as a journey of discovery, camaraderie, and memorable sights.

In Banff, the students explored the Art in Nature Trail, an outdoor gallery where unique art pieces could be found every 50 meters. Surrounded by the beautiful landscape, the students gained a new appreciation for how environment can influence artistic expression.

MCS SADD CHAPTER: KEEPING SASKATCHEWAN HIGHWAYS SAFE DURING THE SUMMER

Despite the summer break, the Melville Comprehensive School (MCS) SADD (Students Against Drinking and Driving) Chapter remained dedicated to its mission, solidifying its reputation as the Most Active SADD Chapter in the province. Travelers across Saskatchewan may have noticed their "If you drink, don't get carried away!" billboards strategically placed throughout the province.

This summer, new 4' X 8' permanent billboards were installed at key locations, including along Highway 47 near Melville and Highway 10 near Balcarres. Additionally, three large 10' X 40' non-permanent billboards were rented from Prairie Billboards and placed along Highway 1 East near Sintaluta, Highway 1 West near Chaplain, and Highway 16 West near Delmas on the way to Lloydminster, home of the 2024 Summer Games. In a show of support for other Good Spirit School Division SADD Chapters, the MCS SADD Chapter also funded two permanent billboards for the Invermay SADD Chapter, which are set to be installed this fall.

The MCS SADD Chapter started their "If you drink, don't get carried away!" billboard campaign last June when they placed an 8' X 12' permanent billboard outside of Melville. At this time, the MCS SADD Chapter collaborated with several partners including SGI, Matthews Funeral Home, Tracy Kerestesh Photography, the City of Melville, and SADD Saskatchewan to design a striking image of six MCS students carrying a coffin—a stark reminder of the fatal consequences of impaired driving.

As the new school year starts, the MCS SADD Chapter is eager to continue its fight against impaired driving. The MCS SADD chapter extends its gratitude to SGI and the Acquired Brain Injury Project Community Grant Program for their generous grant of \$9,311.35, which made this life-saving project possible.



The day began with a prayer from Elder Christianne Stevens and the blessing of the Canadian, Saskatchewan, and Treaty 4 flags. An honor song led by Aaron Tootoosis and Robert Severight followed, as Board Chair Jaime Johnson, Director of Education Quintin Robertson, and Keeseekoose First Nation Councillor Kevin Musqua raised the flags.

The morning continued with Aaron Tootoosis presenting the history of Treaty 4, followed by a screening of Treaty Road - Episode 4, and a lunch of Bannock and soup. GSSD recognizes that we are all treaty people, and that the Division resides on Treaty 4 land. We are committed to honoring Indigenous history, supporting truth and reconciliation, and continuing the journey forward through education and action.

SALTCOATS SCHOOL AUTUMN SUMMIT CELEBRATES 40 YEARS!

Over the years, schools from as far away as Tisdale and Maryfield have traveled to the Saltcoats Regional Park to attend the race. Even in 2020, when restrictions didn't allow for other schools to attend, students from Saltcoats School took to the field and ran the race, thus continuing the tradition. It's even become a multigenerational event with stories of parents who raced in the event coming to watch their children run or a Coach bringing students to the event they once raced in. Typically, between 700 and 800 participate in the event, with the highest number of runners in one year at just over 1,000. The Autumn Summit is the largest Cross Country event in Saskatchewan and Western Manitoba.





The 40th Annual Saltcoats School Autumn Summit Cross Country Race was held on Friday, September 27th at the Saltcoats Regional Park. 34 schools attended from the Good Spirit School Division, Christ the Teacher School Division, as well as other schools from Southeastern Saskatchewan. Over 700 runners took part in this year's event.

As part of the opening ceremonies, Brian Jones and Morley Maier, two founding organizers of the Autumn Summit were recognized. In 1984, the two men, along with the late Fred Nicholson (former Principal of Saltcoats School), acknowledged there was little opportunity for children to participate in long distance races. After many hours of planning, preparing, and organizing, the trio sent out the invite to Yorkdale, Bredenbury, MacNutt, Calder and Theodore for what became the First Annual Saltcoats Autumn Summit in 1985. The first race consisted of grades 7, 8 and 9, where approximately 35 runners competed. The following year the Yorkton Regional High School asked to participate and the rest, as they say, is history.




