

STUDENTS FROM MELVILLE COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL ATTEND THE THRONE SPEECH

On November 25, 2024, Melville Comprehensive School (MCS) teacher Don Wihak and students Nash Wandy and Lily Stevens experienced a memorable day at the Saskatchewan Legislature, attending the Throne Speech as special guests of MLA Warren Kaeding. This unique opportunity stemmed from MLA Kaeding's earlier visit to the Grade 7 class, where he engaged with students as part of the "Student Vote" program in the lead-up to the provincial election.

During his visit, Mr. Kaeding was impressed by the students' insightful questions and their evident engagement with the political process. That interaction left a lasting impression, leading to an invitation for Mr. Wihak and two students to join him at the Throne Speech.

Nash and Lily had the rare chance to witness the ceremony and traditions surrounding the opening of a new government session. Mr. Wihak noted how extraordinary it was to experience the event, as they were among the few educators and students present.

A personal highlight of the day was the tour led by MLA Kaeding after the Throne Speech. The group visited the Premier's office and explored the historic cabinet room, the only space in the legislative building that remains in its original state. This intimate tour offered an up-close look at the inner workings of government.

The reception following the speech was busy, but it provided plenty of opportunities for connection. Among the standout moments was a conversation with the Premier, who warmly welcomed the group and took time to speak with Nash and Lily. The Premier even noticed Nash's cross-country hoodie and chatted about the unique experiences of having a teacher as a parent. For the students, this interaction brought a human touch to politics, helping them see leaders as approachable and relatable individuals.



Nash and Lily left with a deeper understanding of civic engagement and a newfound perspective on the political process. The experience underscored the idea that politicians, regardless of their party affiliation, care deeply about the province—and it sparked a sense of possibility in the students. Both Nash and Lily could envision themselves stepping into similar roles in the future.

Thank you to MLA Warren Kaeding for creating such a meaningful and inspiring experience and to Mr. Wihak for fostering opportunities that connect students to the broader world. Experiences like these enrich education beyond the classroom, reminding students of the important role they can play in shaping their communities and future.



COLUMBIA SCHOOL HOLDS LOUIS RIEL CELEBRATION

On November 15, 2024, the Columbia school community participated in an educational celebration of the Métis culture. Throughout the morning, students and staff attended a series of sessions designed to highlight the rich history, traditions, and contributions of the Métis people.

The sessions included:

- beading; students were taught how to bead a Métis Flag keychain
- Métis dot art; everyone contributed to a Métis dot art garden display
- bannock making; students were taught how to make their own Bannock
- jigging; students and staff learned the basic step of jigging as well as a few fancy steps
- pemican making; taught about the history of pemmican and how it was prepared
- a session that explored the significance of Louis Riel's leadership and his role in shaping Canada's history

The day was an opportunity for everyone to gain a deeper understanding of Métis culture and the ongoing contributions of the Métis Nation.

Columbia is proud to have dedicated this day to learning, reflection, and celebration, in hopes that it fostered a greater appreciation for all things Métis. FAMILY ENGAGEMENT IN KINDERGARTEN

Family engagement is about creating relationships with families to develop a shared responsibility for their children's education. GSSD recognizes that families are essential contributors to their children's growth and development.

With this in mind, schools invite families into the classroom to participate as members of the learning community.



This year, teachers have been focusing their first family engagement window on helping families understand the Early Years Evaluation (EYE) assessment that all kindergarten students undergo.



The EYE assessment evaluates five key domains of development that contribute to a child's readiness to read, including listening, focusing attention, developing oral language, building phonological awareness, and strengthening fine and gross motor skills. Families were invited to engage in activity stations with their child that reflect tasks from the EYE assessment. Each station included scoring documents to help parents identify areas where their child may benefit from additional focus, along with suggested activities for home to support growth in these areas.

Teachers will complete the formal EYE assessments in class, and the results will be shared with families to support their child's development throughout the year.

KINDERGARTEN ENGAGEMENT AT DR. BRASS

During the last week of November, Dr. Brass Kindergarten families were welcomed into the classroom to explore letters, numbers, and fine motor skills with their children.

On November 13, 2024, over 65 students from the Good Spirit School Division and Keeseekoose First Nation gathered for THINK Business, a career-focused event at the Yorkton Regional High School.

Sponsored by GSSD, Suncrest College, Regina District Industry Education Council (RDIEC), the University of Regina's Paul J. Hill School of Business, and the Kinsmen U18 AAA Maulers, the event highlighted career opportunities in business for Grades 10–12 students.

The day featured engaging presentations, including Suncrest College's Jenna Niebergall, who introduced diverse business careers, and Syed Kamal from the University of Regina, who detailed study pathways in accounting, marketing, HR, and more. The attendees were then treated to a Question-and-Answer Session with a panel of local business professionals. During this presentation entitled, 'Building Business Brilliance,' the students heard the stories of six panelists; David Balysky (General Manager, City of Yorkton), Jason Croswell (Team Manager, AgriStability Unit of Sask Crop Insurance), Kristin Martinuik (Barrister & Solicitor, Kondratoff Persick LLP), Payton Molnar (Banner Bison), Sarah Nelson (Human Resources Specialist, Cornerstone Credit Union), and Sean Thompson (Hallow Clothing Co.). MOSAIC K3 AND K2 MINE TOUR IN ESTERHAZY

On October 15, 2024, 12 educators had the unique opportunity to take part in the RDIEC/Mosaicsponsored Mine Tour. This incredible experience provided valuable insights into mining operations, especially for those exploring an underground mine for the first time.

The day began with participants suiting up in full safety gear, including coveralls, hard hats, and emergency breathing apparatuses. They then descended 1.6 km underground via a multi-level elevator, marking the start of an eye-opening journey. Once underground, they observed massive machinery in action, including a miner (a machine) cutting into the potash wall while a conveyor system transported the material to processing locations. Mosaic staff explained the intricate ventilation systems that keep the mine safe and operational, showcasing the science behind air control in such an environment.

This hands-on learning experience offered a fascinating glimpse into the mining industry and its innovative operations, leaving participants deeply appreciative of the opportunity provided by Mosaic.


